TEACHING AMERICAN HISTORY PROJECT – 2009-2012

Lesson Title – We Didn't Start the Fire from Melissa Szych Grade - 8

Length of class period – 90 minutes (can be split into two 45 minutes classes)

Inquiry – (What essential question are students answering, what problem are they solving, or what decision are they making?)

What were some of the major events or people involved in shaping the United States in the late 20^{th} Century?

How was the event or person responsible for how we live today? Why was the event or person so influential?

Objectives (What content and skills do you expect students to learn from this lesson?)

Familiarize students to some important events or people of the late 20^{th} Century to begin a larger unit spanning the entire 20^{th} Century

Develop research skills by viewing websites and trying to determine the validity and reliability of the sites visited

Enhance Oral Presentation skills

Materials (What primary sources or local resources are the basis for this lesson?) – (please attach)

Billy Joel's song, "We Didn't Start the Fire"

Activities (What will you and your students do during the lesson to promote learning?)

Students will listen to the song, "We Didn't Start the Fire" by Billy Joel and then engage in a brief discussion on what the song is about.

Students will then be assigned a topic listed in the song to research how or why the person or event was listed in the song. Was this person or event someone or something to be considered important in influencing the shaping of the United States in the late 20^{th} Century?

Students will practice and enhance their research skills by visiting websites to find information on their topic. They must visit and submit a list of at least 3 websites to verify that the information found is valid and reliable. If they find varying information, they need to use a forth website.

Students will create a 2-minute presentation on their topic. The presentation will be verbal; however a PowerPoint presentation or poster may be created to help present the information.
